# **Speakers**

#### Jen Lynch



After returning to Ireland from Denmark in 2015, Jen worked on a range of projects with BirdWatch Ireland (primarily focusing on seabirds and waders) and with the RSPB (monitoring breeding Curlew). In February 2017 she took on the role of Peregrine Survey Coordinator with the IRSG and has recently started a position as Conservation Ranger with the NPWS in Monaghan. Based in Warrenpoint, she also co-ordinates wetland bird counts of Carliingford Lough and is an active ringer with the Belfast and Down Ringing Group.

#### **Chris Rollie**

A former science teacher in Ayrshire, Chris has worked with the RSPB for 27 years. He started as a Conservation Officer and has been an Area Manager since 2000. He has actively monitored a variety of Raptor species in SW Scotland for 35 years and has been chairman of the Dumfries and Galloway Raptor Study Group for 25 years. Chris managed the red kite re-introduction project to Galloway and the related Galloway Kite Trail Project, and has been chair of the UK and Ireland Red Kite Co— ordination Group these past five years. He has been studying the honey buzzard since first breeding in Scotland, in France and on migration in Spain and Syria.



#### John Lusby



John Lusby is a research ecologist with a special and life-long interest in birds of prey and owls. His work is concentrated on trying to achieve a better understanding of the status and ecology of raptor populations in Ireland, and how we can best use raptors as indicators to measure wider biodiversity change and impacts and ultimately to inform conservation policy, with a focus on land-use change including afforestation, the expansion of road networks, as well as pesticide use. John works with BirdWatch Ireland and established the Raptor Conservation Project in 2009 and is also a passionate environmentalist and educator.

### **Mike Thornton**

Mike Thornton currently works for Scottish Natural Heritage and has had an interest In raptors from an early age. He is a member of the Lothian and Borders Raptor Study Group and has worked on a number of species, including sparrowhawks, golden eagles, (national census work), eagle owls, peregrines, merlins and hen harriers. He set up the Edinburgh Hawkwatch project in 2009 and monitored urban sparrowhawks in Edinburgh .Between 2009 and 2015. Mike is particularly interested in the population dynamics, urban ecology and migration ecology of raptors



#### **Cathleen Thomas**




Ecologist, Dr.Cathleen Thomas leads the Hen Harrier LIFE+ project, an ambitious five year programme of hen harrier conservation, advocacy and engagement, working cross-border in the UK. The project combines satellite tagging, investigative work, on the ground surveying and monitoring, nest protection, winter roost protection, advocacy and community engagement to help secure the future for one of our most beautiful and threatened birds of prey.
